

Sussex Police local perspective to support the 'County Lines' theatre production

- Sussex police estimate that they have approximately 65 active county lines. In addition to this there are other local dealers who operate in the area.
- In total Sussex estimates that there are in excess of 350 telephone numbers (known as deal lines) which are used to facilitate the supply of controlled drugs.
- Key Sussex areas for County Lines operations are:
 - Hastings
 - Eastbourne
 - Bognor
 - o Brighton
 - Worthing
- Exploitation of vulnerable adults is common feature:
 - Cuckooing where drug dealers take over the home of a vulnerable person in order to use it as a base for drug dealing
 - Debt bondage where deception, threats, or other forms of intimidation are used to force children to work off debts that can never be repaid
- Exploitation of children is common feature:
 - o 17% of lines have trafficked children i.e. out of force
 - o 10% of Sussex lines use children in their operations
 - o 3% use children for sexual purposes
 - The youngest child the police have identified is only 13 years old.
- Signs of involvement in drug distribution vary significantly from person to person but can include:
 - Social withdrawal or extrovert behaviours
 - An increase in school and home absences
 - New clothing and possessions
 - o More than one mobile phone
 - A change in peer groups
 - o A sense of being distracted or loss of interest in previous hobbies
 - Poor hygiene
 - Tiredness and lethargy
 - o In the worst cases, the carrying of or suggestion of the carrying of weapons
